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MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JODY

“Now the *Lord* is the *Spirit*, and where the *Spirit* of the *Lord* is, there is freedom.”
— 2 Corinthians 3:17

Greetings Family and Friends of PUMC!

Since 1976 the month of February has been designated as Black History Month in the United States. For nearly 50 years it has been a time to tell the real story of brave men and women of color who have lived in a world which has too often refused to recognize their full humanity, let alone celebrate their contributions. The story of our black sisters and brothers is certainly worth being told, and it is worth being listened to. I hope we will all take the time to listen deeply this month. Deeply listening to another lessens the divide between “us” and “them”. There is one story of humanity being told, a story in which we all participate, and it is important to honestly face our failures, even as we recognize and celebrate the unique contributions and distinctiveness of particular people and groups in that collective story.

I sometimes feel a bit worried during Black History month; worried that we might be tempted to think this is the only time to hear these stories. Certainly, we must not let this be the case. Rather, this is a time of special focus and emphasis, bringing due attention to areas that too often have gone unnoticed, if not willfully ignored. We choose not to ignore the importance of these stories.

I want to briefly tell just one right now, the story of Harry Hosier. Better known in his lifetime as, “Black Harry,” little is known about the early years of his life, as is the case with many individuals born into slavery. Most historians believe he was born in the south around 1750, and became a freedman following the American Revolution, moving to Maryland. After meeting the first Methodist Bishop, Francis Asbury, they became traveling companions in the work of the church in early America. Asbury referred to their meeting as, “providentially arranged.”

After some time, Hosier started to share with congregations following Asbury’s sermons, urging them to heed the bishop’s call. He was a passionate supporter of the Methodist Movement. Though illiterate himself, Bishop Asbury would read the Bible aloud during their travels, deepening Hosier’s understanding of and passion for the good news. He preached his first sermon, “The Barren Fig Tree,” in Virginia in 1781, following a message from Bishop Asbury. 3 years later he became the first person of color to preach to a white congregation, in Charlestown, Delaware.

His contemporaries marveled at his powerful preaching and his spiritual presence. The Methodist Preacher Freeborn Garrison noted the distance people would travel to hear Hosier and the delight they would take in his message. Circuit Ride Henry Boehm said of him, “His voice was musical, and his tongue as the pen of a ready writer. He was unboundedly popular, and many would rather hear him than the bishops.” Benjamin Rush, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, called Hosier, “the greatest orator in America,” and Thomas Coke, America’s second Bishop called him, “one of the best preachers in the world.”

And yet, too many Methodists don’t even know his name. His is not a story for February, but critical to the very existence of Methodism in America and the world today. I invite you to hear his story, in the hope that it might encourage you to dig deeper and learn more; more about him and other people of color who are an indispensable part of our human story. May your exploration lead you to a deeper appreciation for all, and a more profound understanding of what it means to be the children of God together. Blessings on the journey!

THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

The United Methodist movement has a long history of involvement in issues of social justice. *John Wesley* worked hard to alleviate inhumane conditions in factories, to promote gender equality, to combat child labor, and he wrote in opposition to the slave trade in England and America. In fact, the last letter he wrote before dying was to the anti-slavery crusader *William Wilburforce*, urging him to "Go on, in the name of *God* and in the power of his might, till even American slavery (the vilest that ever saw the sun) shall vanish away before it." Concern for social justice is in our denominational DNA! The Social Principles of the United Methodist Church emphasize the many ways we work towards this end.

I am announcing the formation of a Social Justice Team at PUMC and inviting all interested individuals to reach out if they'd like to be part of it. I believe the work of social justice is already alive and well at PUMC, and I can already imagine some folks saying, "this is all we need, another group to meet!" This group is intended to offer big picture support and coordination to the efforts already underway by the different groups in our church. Dismantling Racism is doing amazing work to raise awareness, dismantle broken systems, and promote healing . . . and their work will continue. Missions and Evangelism Teams engage regularly in projects and service that offer tangible responses to the injustices in our own community. . . and their work will continue. Discipleship and Sunday School classes teach *Jesus'* important message of justice and his model of love . . . and they will keep teaching. All of this work will continue. The Social Justice Team will be a venue to discuss and coordinate the diverse social justice interests of people in this church, like concern for racial equality, gender equality, support for those of diverse sexual orientations or gender identities, environmental care, economic justice, and more. Though no one person can do everything, and no single congregation can solve all of the world's problems, together we are always able to accomplish more than we will on our own. 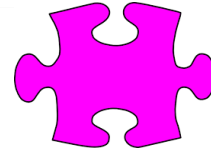

SPOTLIGHT ON STEWARDSHIP: PIECE #1 - TALENT

Not only did she use her talent for her catering business, but she also generously shared her talent with her church – preparing countless church dinners for all kinds of occasions. I know a lot of hard work went into each meal, but *Bea* (and her team) made it seem easy. *Bea* was also generous in sharing the recipes for her fabulous food. She was a terrific steward of her talent!

STEWARDSHIP SUPERCHARGE REPORT FOR 2022

The final numbers are in! As of December 31, 2022:

Total Pledged plus Non-Pledged (Donations) giving for 2022 was \$346,382, which was \$35,766 more than our combined budget goal of \$310,616. Between pledged and non-pledged giving, we literally gave more than 111% of our budget goals in 2022. The generosity of this congregation continues to be a testament to *God*'s abundant love amidst life's troubles. **Thank you!**

Actuals vs Plan as of **December 31, 2022**, the end of the **12 months fiscal year**, the **Total Revenue = 87.2%**, and **Total Expenses = 84.0%**.

For your information, apportionment apportionment payments are paid monthly and are current as of **December 31st**.

SOME OF WHAT YOUR FINANCE COMMITTEE HAS ACCOMPLISHED IN 2022 INCLUDES

- **2022 Budget** — Finalizing 2022 Budget cash flow that included anticipated revenues & expenses of \$413,835. To balance the budget, anticipated revenues included allocating \$49,079.00 of prior year retained revenues. As of December 31st, revenues have exceeded expenses (see Net Ordinary Income, above). (FYI — The 2022 cash flows are not yet final. There are a few minor adjustments to be completed by our accountant. We anticipate all 2022 cash flow to be finalized by the end of January)
- **2023 Budget Planning** is complete and approved by Church Council on January 4, 2023. To balance the budget, anticipated revenues included allocating **\$86,029.34** of prior year retained revenues.
- **Audit of 2022 Church Finances** to commence in February 2023.
- **Shred Event** - Is tentatively planned for Wednesday, April 26, 2023, to reduce the volume of unneeded paper records. This event will be open to the congregation to bring your unneeded paper records to shred, for a small fee.
- **Employee Retention Credit (ERC) is part of the Paycheck Protection Program of the CARES Act.** This is a reimbursement credit against part of our employee salaries in both 2020 and 2021. The church bookkeeper, *Matt Regan*, CPA, is investigating eligibility for this program.

- Due to generous donations from the congregation, the year was completed with \$35,000 in additional pledges and donations. The new budget was prepared using lower pledge income and higher donations.
- Louise Dalton will be honored for her service to the church at a later time.
- A motion was approved to accept a gift of a baby grand piano, if the offer is confirmed. Moving costs will be paid by the church.
- The 2023 Budget, presented from the Finance Committee, was approved.
- *John Marrine* was approved as a co-Lay Leader.
- The next meeting will be held on Wednesday, February 1st.

YOUTH HANDBELL CHOIR

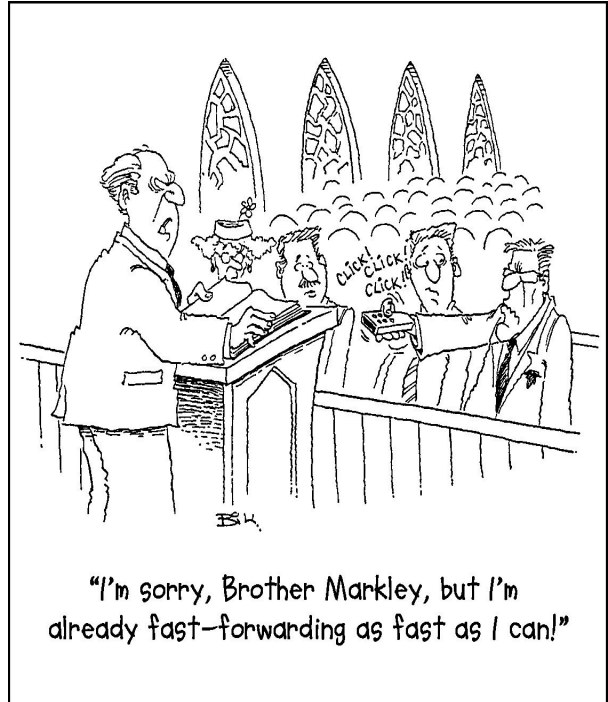
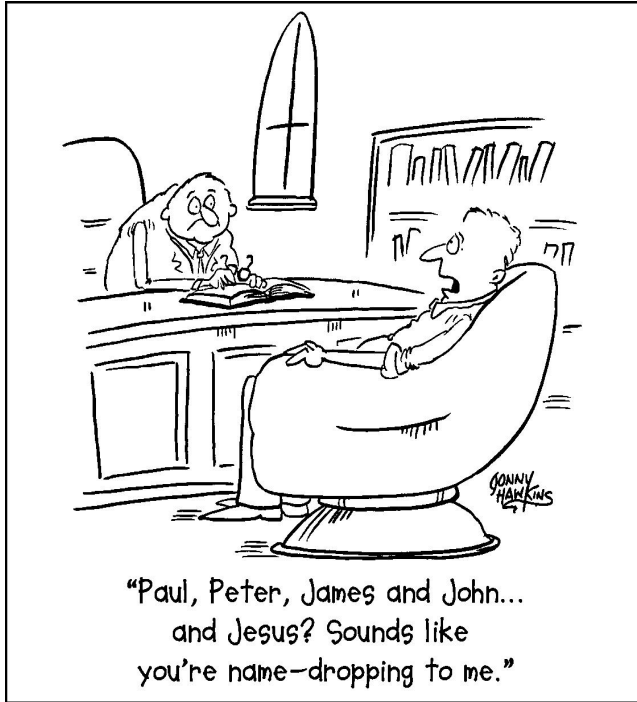

THE FINAL STEP IN SELLING THE BANGALL CHURCH BUILDING



On January 11th, *Steve Bruman* the realtor representing PUMC, completed the transfer of the former church building to the buyer. The merger of the two churches, BUMC and PUMC, has been completed last year, but it took until a few days ago to empty the building, clean it and allow the buyer to move in. It was delayed because PUMC needed the approval of the NY Supreme Court and to allow the nursery school, that met on the lower level, to find a new home. For many years the BUMC sponsored a nursery school that met on the lower level, but with the sale of the building they lost their space. After searching for many months, they received permission to meet in a room in the Stanfordville Town hall.

The buyer of the building is a business man dealing in comic books. He plans to make some changes to the building and then make it his residence. Fellowship hall will be his living room, the rooms occupied by the nursery school will become his bedrooms and the sanctuary may well become storage for his stock.

At the buyer's request we closed on the sale of the church in December, however the nursery school needed to complete their semester on December 23rd and move to the new location over Christmas and New Year. A few days ago the building was ready, the nursery school finished the move, the realtor and the buyer completed the final step. A thank you to all who helped with the merger, the sale and the move.



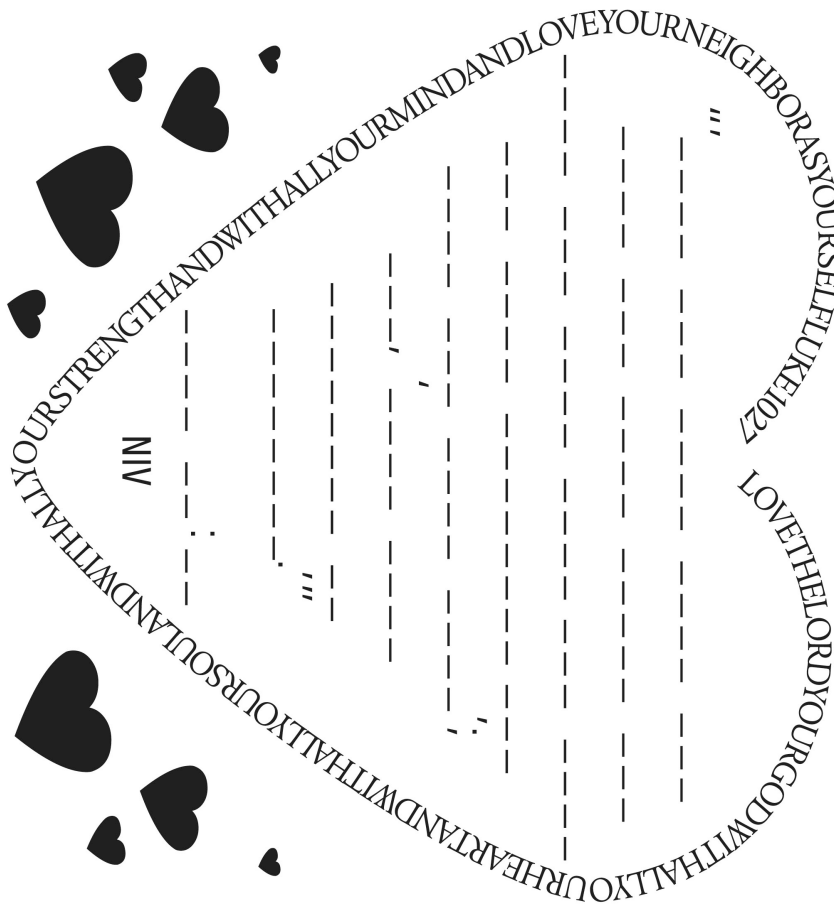
A THOUGHT
