¹⁴ For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, ¹⁵ by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace, ¹⁶ and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility.

"Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!" flows the traditional Easter proclamation by the faithful. Jesus, whom the religious and secular authorities thought they had eliminated, God has raised to be the center of the spiritual universe, drawing all people to himself, as he claims in John 12:32. I love that image of drawing people to him. When rightly understood and thoroughly applied, there is a strong attraction to the Christian faith.

I heard of a US General who demonstrated two leadership models with a piece of string. He laid the string flat out on his desk. Then, from one end, he pushed. Predictably, the string bunched up to be pushed along in a mess by the point of his finger. He straightened the string out again. This time, he used his finger to pull the string along. As predictably, it remained straight, following his finger no matter where it led—his finger drew it along.

In Christ, God chose to draw us along rather than staying with the push of commandment and law. Drawing us along is the way that God decided to reconcile and bring peace between us and God. The cross, God's passion, love, and grace, center and stabilize us, not personally only. We are communally drawn to each other the more Christ draws us to Himself. In Christ, we are centered, given purpose and direction, and offered a penultimate avenue for peace.

One other image that comes to mind is the Oort Cloud. This cloud is the cloud that surrounds our universe. It is the paradigm of chaos. In the Oort Cloud, debris expresses its energy by random flights in the hugeness of space or expends its energy through massive collisions and gravitational attractions to larger objects. The Oort Cloud is neither good nor bad. Objects do what objects do. That is all. But most of it is pointless, and only rarely, over millions of years, does it produce anything structured around a single point versus the exact opposite, a singularity known as a Black Hole. Once a Black Hole catches

the chaos of debris in its gravity, debris does not escape but becomes part of the mass to draw in more wayward debris.

The cross centers us and becomes our singularity where order and peace find their home. In Christ, we are no longer a group of lovely people doing beautiful things haphazardly in the universe's chaos, expanding and diluting our energies in infinite trajectories and collisions of fracturing diminution. When God draws us closer to Christ and takes us into his singularity, we find in him not only focus but peace. We become a committed part of the mission of the Church to draw all to Jesus's peace. No matter what happens, divisions or diversions arise, Jesus is our center, ultimate hope, and infinite horizon.

Christ is risen! God has made eternal peace with humanity. It is up to us to bring faith's singularity to the world. In Jesus' name, AMEN.



SPRING BLESSINGS TO ALL! In Christ's Service, Polly James



Sometimes you are granted such timing as Easter this year. It comes right at the end of March, so while I am sitting here writing a Journey article in Lent about an Easter hymn, the timing will be as such, I hope, that when you read this, it won't be too far from when we celebrated Easter.

"Up From the Grave He Arose" was written by Robert Lowry (1826-1899) in 1874. Lowry had a fondness for music in his early years, learning various musical instruments as a child. He entered ministry work at age 28, and was not only an excellent preacher, brilliant speaker, and a thorough Bible student but also had a rare administrative ability.

"Up From the Grave He Arose" uses the tune "Christ Arose" which was also composed by Lowry. He wrote the hymn and tune while he was pastor of the First Baptist Church in Lewisburg, PA and published it in <u>Brightest and Best</u> (1875), a church school songbook that was edited by Lowry and William Doane.

The hymn is suggested in every lectionary year for Easter Day. The verses and refrain present a contrast between the buried Jesus and the risen Jesus. It has been noted that the refrain is what makes the hymn very popular, and is a jubilant celebration of the Resurrection.

A fun fact about this hymn – in the first edition written, Lowry marked the refrain "Faster" which has now become a standard practice for playing and singing of the hymn.




