["]But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law."

Galatians 5:22-23

I used to have quite a temper. As the youngest of three siblings, I often took the brunt of the teasing of my older brothers, who always seemed

to have better answers and more skill than me. I remember one Florida summer morning putting my hand through two of the panes of a jalousie glass window in our front door with which my brothers had locked me out of the house. They were snickering on the other side of the door. What was I to do? Smash and crash. They let me in. I think I was the one who got in trouble because Dad had to buy new glass for the door.

Patience is a kind of kryptonite for me. I wouldn't say I like waiting in line or traffic. I tolerate it now better than I used to. Patience is one of the fruits of the Spirit that continues to mature on my faith vine.

It occurs to me that in Paul's list of "love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control," there are plenty of challenges for the average person to work on individually and collectively. Yet, as we look at this list, it is never a *fait accompli*, but even as we are, a life in faith is a work in progress. Spiritual gifts are not fruit that anyone can say has ripened to God's ideal of perfection but continue to grow in a believer's life.

Which leads me back to patience. Patience is a rare commodity in our culture. I love the original movie *Willy Wonka & the Chocolate Factory*, which was made in 1971. One of the things that I enjoy is how each of the children represents some of the less-than-positive attributes of American culture. The one I find myself quoting most is Veruca Salt. Rich, impatient, over-indulged, manipulative, and immature, director Mel Stuart probably thought he was holding up a mirror to the generations emerging post World War II. I certainly think Veruca's attitude expressed in the words "I don't care how I want it now!" could be the mantra of generations since the 1940s.

The problem is that we forget that transformation and new directions take time if they are ever fully completed. That is what I have always loved about being a Christian. There is

never a sense of having arrived. We are all works in progress that need a balanced application of the fullness of the fruits of the Spirit to enable a lasting and productive Christian community. We are all a part of the onward march to perfection that others will take up the standard for when I am long dead and buried.

In the millennial march of the Church of Jesus Christ, we care how because ends do not justify means, and we don't have to have it now because transformation, evolution takes time. So, how is your balance of "love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control?" Is there any kryptonite in the list that challenges you? Remember that God values the forward movement, not where you are or get to when life is done. Just keep working on the whole list as you go on to perfect, bringing those about along with you.

JUST A FEW PERSONAL THOUGHTS FOR AUGUST



Whenever I was planning a worship service at Wappingers, my Mom always wanted to know what hymns I was planning to use in the service. One I used with some frequency, though not as often as my ever favorite 155, was "Here I Am, Lord."

Another modern hymn in our hymnal, "Here I Am, Lord" was written by Daniel Laurent Schutte (1947) in 1981. Schutte is a composer of Catholic liturgical music as well as a contemporary Christian songwriter who has over 165 published hymns. At the time Schutte was a Jesuit studying theology when a friend asked him, last minute, to write something for an upcoming diaconate ordination Mass. Over the course of two days Schutte wrote the hymn which received much praise during the ordination Mass. Since then Schutte has received both positive and negative commentary on the hymn. The tune name, which bears the same name as the hymn, was also written by Schutte.

It is a recommended song during all three lectionary years with suggested use during Epiphany as well as several suggested weeks during Ordinary Time.

If you are curious about this song and its lyrics, you can look at number 593 in our United Methodist Hymnal. (References from Hymnary.org and Americamagazine.org)

HANDBELLS IN THE FALL

- **JOYFUL RINGERS** will commence rehearsals October 15 at 6:00 in the choir room. We practice for an hour every Tuesday. This is for adults and young adults.
- HALO BELLS will commence rehearsals October 13 after Sunday morning services in room 33. We start about 15 minutes after services (to give kids the time to get some snack and refreshment) and practice 30-45 minutes. This is for children in the 3rd grade and older.
- No serious music background is necessary. If you can count to four and know left from right, you are good!



If you are interested but hesitant to commit, contact me. We can meet at church and I will bring out some bells for you to try handling, look at some music to see how music is marked and parts are played. You can start with one bell or two, entirely up to you. After we play for a Sunday service, you can decide to continue or not.

Please contact me as soon as you can: during the summer I will be choosing music but cannot decide upon any pieces until I know how many ringers there will be.
