"When God wants an important thing done in this world or a wrong righted, He goes about it in a very singular way. He doesn't release thunderbolts or stir up earthquakes. God simply has a tiny baby born, perhaps of a very humble home, perhaps of a very humble mother. And God puts the idea or purpose into the mother's heart. And she puts it in the baby's mind, and then – God waits. The great events of this world are not battles and elections and earthquakes and thunderbolts. The great events are babies, for each child comes with the message that God is not yet discouraged with humanity, but is still expecting goodwill to become incarnate in each human life. "

Unlike Zeus on Mount Olympus at a wave of whose hand other gods tremble and the very foundations of the earth shake, the God of Abraham, our God, chooses to work in the midst of humanity, in human form, that we might know the depths of impassioned love from the God who is intimately involved with creation. This is one of the great mysteries and comforts of the incarnation, for God spoke for the first time in human form in the unintelligible tones of a baby's cry. Indeed, no thunderbolt, no shaft of lightning streaking across the sky in victorious fury. Only the gentle light of a passing star, the tender sounds of livestock settling in for the night, shepherds in their fields, and a child, newborn, softly crying to his mother in the night. What sublime images. Unlike the God of the Exodus, who visits Pharaoh with plague and heaviness. This is God on terms we can understand and relate to, vulnerable and fragile, yet God all the same.

Christmas is very much the celebration of the ordinary. This baby is not the son of a monarch. This child is not born of privilege or status, just like so many of us; his impact comes from his calling and his faith. The message he has is not co-opted by any party of his time, nor is meant to be. Jesus rises up from the dirt and dust of humanity to shake

the earth more violently than any other natural phenomenon in history. Not even great earthquakes maintain such a history, let alone a storm, but this baby, this child, opens up a new world, a new life about him, and the foundations of creation shake to their core.

This humble beginning holds profound lessons for us all as we reflect on this potential in human life. In sending a tiny baby into the world with a divine purpose, God shows that humanity does not discourage God. With each baby born, there is the possibility for transformation. God still expects the *gospel*, the Good News, which is the unique life of the baby Jesus, God incarnate, in the flesh, so we might be born again, made right with God, released of all those things that bind us from living our gifted potential. This Christmas, take time to remember the life of God incarnate in that Bethlehem baby, but in your reflection, consider that potential God has caused to come into this world in you.

May you and yours have a blessed and merry Christmas this season. And may the God and Author of human life bless your homes with the full potential of love. In Christ's name. AMEN.

Church Council Highlights

A Council meeting was held on November 6th. Highlights included:

 Plans are in place for Veterans' Day, the Longest Night and Christmas Eve worship services. Advent decorating will take place on November 30th and caroling will be on December 14th.



- The election day pie bake sale was a great success and special thanks were given to Carla and Curtis Vinson, who organized a large group of volunteers.
- Thanksgiving baskets will be delivered on November 22nd and 120 families will receive them this year. Members will be asked to buy gifts for 137 children listed on the Angel Tree.
- Things are going well with the Casa de Adoracion use of the church, and clearer lines of communication are being established.
- A simpler system for use of the technology equipment in Fellowship Hall is being devised.
- Plans are moving forward for a new contemporary worship service, which is projected to start in January. Members of the Way Forward committee continue to provide additional information.
- A preliminary 2025 budget was adopted. Additional income is being provided by the lease agreement with Casa de Adoracion and the trustees agreement to cover landscaping and snow removal expenses.
- To increase communications, the possibility of utilizing apps for text messaging is being investigated.
- If needed, the next Council meeting will be on Wednesday, December 4th.

NOTES FROM THE CHOIR ROOM


Charles Wesley, 1734

When everyone reads the newsletter, we will be in Advent. And, I think one of the more common Advent hymns (and one of my favorites) is "Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus".

This was a hymn written by Charles Wesley (1707-1788) in 1744. Charles was the great hymn-writer of the Wesley family, with this hymn being one of his no less than 6,500 written hymns. It was printed his in book, *Hymns for the Nativity of our Lord*. The intent of the hymn was to not only remember Christ's first coming but praying for Christ's return. Wesley wrote the hymn to bring the longing for God's advent to a personal level. Also to note, the hymn repeats the word "born" in the beginning of three consecutive lines in the second stanza.



There are a multitude of tunes used for this hymn. The one in our hymnal is called Hyfrydol, written by Rowland H. Prichard in 1830. Additional hymn tunes include Stuttgart written by Christian Friedrich Witt in 1715, Advent Gospel written by Scott Werdebaugh in 2018, Cross of Jesus/Stainer written by John Stainer in 1887, and Wilson, from the tenor aria number 4 in Felix Mendelssohn's oratorio, Elijah in 1846. Fun fact, this last tune did appear in the 1905 edition of the Methodist hymnal.

"Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus" has a place in all three lectionary years, mostly used during Advent but it can also be used on Christmas Eve and during the season of Epiphany.
