Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it."

Matthew 16:24-25

What do you think about when I say the words grief and loss? Do you think of the most tragic life transitions you have faced, such as a death or separation from a loved one? I know that that is what first comes to mind when I hear these words, but grieving and loss are daily activities for most people.

We grieve over the loss of the smallest of hopes as well as the grandest of dreams. We're overlooked for that promotion, we find out that we have not been given the raise we thought we deserved, or a relationship we hoped would last ends suddenly, and we feel helplessly alone, mourning the past and the future all at the same time. To live is to encounter loss and change. It's no wonder we dislike disruptions caused by the unexpected or uninvited.

It is also of little wonder that science has found that times of stress caused by worry or change are opportune times for illness and disease. Ungrieved loss leads to stifled development and stress: We cannot go forward in happy, healthy, and productive living until we have accepted that we lost something and put it behind us.

In many ways, Christ calls us—like his disciples—to live boldly when faced with loss. Koalas are among several animals that would rather starve than adapt to a new diet. Rather than letting go of the familiar for the unknown, they starve in a forest. Like koalas who resist change to their detriment, we often cling to what is familiar rather than embracing the growth that comes with loss.

Unlike koalas, we are called to adapt and embrace change. Christian psychologist Gary Collins emphasizes this in his discussion of loss, writing that we, as Christians, "...are called to be experts in the fine art of losing." Collins goes on to define what this looks like:

...[W]e press on with dreams that God may have given. But we must hold everything lightly, maintain a willingness to make readjustments in the light of reality, learn to grow through our disappointments or failures, and know in our hearts that God ultimately is in control. That perspective makes Christians... unique.


We follow one who was a loser in the eyes of the world but who showed that he was the ultimate winner when he rose from the dead and ascended to the place of ultimate honor next to the Father. With that perspective, one thing we... never have to lose is hope. (From *Christian Counseling Today*, p. 6)

In the face of grief and loss, we cling to the cross, through which our eternal hope is secured. We trust in Christ's promise: "I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand."

- The proposed 2025 budget presented by the Finance Committee was approved.

- A heartfelt discussion was held on issues emanating from Washington, DC and the legal responses we can take as a church. More information will be gathered at a UMC webinar and the discussion will continue at future meetings. The consensus was that we need to be proactive, prepare for possible events, support any of our members who are affected, share our support with Casa de Adoracion, and focus on our love of others.

Our annual Shrove Pancake Supper will take place on Tuesday March 4 @ 5pm


Pastor's Book Study



March 2024 was a rough month for my sister and I. Things started to go downhill for Mom and we knew that despite her insistence that she would do what she needed to do to get home, she was never going to be able to be able to do that. We started to write things about Mom to prepare for an obituary we knew at some point we would have to

provide. And we talked about who would read scripture for us during a service we knew we would need to have when the time came. One last thing we talked about that we both almost said at the same time was that we wanted someone in particular to sing "His Eye Is on the Sparrow." A soloist sang it at our grandmother's funeral and while I never knew it was a favorite of my grandmother's, I did know that my Mom liked it quite a bit. And thanks to the movie Sister Act I was familiar with it as well.

"His Eye Is on the Sparrow" was written by Civilla D. Martin (1866 – 1948) in 1906. Civilla married Rev. John F. Geddes, who was a Congregational Minister in 1891, however there is little information about their marriage or when Rev. Geddes passed. She then attended teaching school and eventually married a Baptist minister, Walter Stillman Martin. She did travel with him doing evangelistic work until she became of frail health and had to remain at home. When Civilla wrote hymns, she only used her first initials "C.D." In addition to "His Eye Is on the Sparrow" she wrote several other hymns including "God Will Take Care of You" in 1904.

"His Eye Is on the Sparrow" is set to the tune called SPARROW, written in 1905 by Charles (Chas) H. Gabriel (1856-1932). Music was always part of Charles' life with the total number of his compositions estimated to be around 7,000 – under the names of Charles H. Gabriel, C.D. Emerson, Charlote G. Homer, S.B. Jackson, A.W. Lawrence, and Jennie Ree.

The hymn is typically suggested for use during Epiphany and Ordinary Time in Year A of the Lectionary cycle and can be found in 103 hymnals.
